The last four years have been marked by unprecedented turmoil in British politics after the European referendum of June 2016 returned a majority in favour of Brexit. If the referendum failed to quell the divisions over the European issue within the ranks of the Conservative party, it certainly brought to the fore a broader divide over values that encompasses a range of identity issues about Britain’s relationship with the outside world and “outsiders” more generally. How has this divide affected UK politics in the past four years?

The last two general elections saw major changes in the party system in the UK, with smaller parties strongly positioning themselves on each side of the Brexit divide while Britain’s two main parties have tried to accommodate both sides of the divide. The Labour party maintained a position of “constructive ambiguity” over Brexit for which it paid a heavy price in the December 2019 general election. Meanwhile, successive rebellions by pro-Brexit Tory MPs impeded Theresa May’s progress over the Withdrawal Agreement she negotiated with EU member-states and ultimately led to her

resignation and Boris Johnson's election as leader. Johnson's strategy to unite most Brexiteer votes behind his leadership and split the Remain vote in the 2019 general election appears to have been a successful one. How has Brexit superseded partisanship in the UK? What are the consequences on Britain's two main parties in terms of organisation, leadership and branding? Have UK mainstream politics disappeared? Can we still talk of a UK party system today?
